STEP 1: KNOW THE VACCINES SCHOOL-AGED CHILDREN AND ADOLESCENTS NEED

Publicly funded vaccinations are recommended at different times for school-aged children in Ontario.

Ages 4-6 years

Tdap-IPV

Vaccine against tetanus, diphtheria, pertussis and polio

MMRV Vaccine for measles, mumps, rubella and varicella (chickenpox) Grade 7

Men-C-ACYW-135 Vaccine against meningococcal disease

HB Vaccine against hepatitis B

HPV Vaccine against human papillomavirus **14-16 years**

Tdap Vaccine against tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis

STEP 2: IDENTIFY ACCESS POINTS WHERE CHILDREN CAN RECEIVE MISSED IMMMUNIZATIONS

- Primary healthcare providers can administer routine vaccines for tetanus, diphtheria, pertussis, polio, measles, mumps, rubella, chickenpox, and meningococcal disease (Men-C-C), which are currently required for school attendance in Ontario.
- Public Health Units can deliver vaccinations recommended for school-aged children. Meningococcal Conjugate ACYW-135, HPV and Hepatitis B vaccines are typically offered at school-based clinics, but in some special circumstances can be ordered by primary health care providers.
- Pharmacies do not currently administer these vaccines, but can administer influenza vaccines to school-aged children.


Plan ahead for your child's immunization appointment. The <u>CARD system</u> is a tool developed by experts to help you and your child(ren) have a better vaccination experience.

STEP 3: REPORT IMMUNIZATIONS TO YOUR LOCAL PUBLIC HEALTH UNIT

Caregivers are required to report their child(ren)'s immunizations to their local public health unit. Caregivers may report their child(ren)'s immunizations using their public health unit's Immunization

Connect Ontario (ICON) reporting tool. ICON is a web-based service provided by the Ministry of Health that allows you to report and view immunization information.

• What are the incentives to maintaining personal immunization records?

- Active involvement in decision-making for health care or medical treatment
- Control of personal health records
- Accessible digital records and printable yellow cards through ICON, even if the caregiver moves within Ontario
 - Currently this does not include records for COVID-19 vaccines
- Records may be needed to participate in childhood or post-secondary programs, travel, and volunteer or employment opportunities
